Number 17 South Street Additional data



Nos. 17 and 19 were owned by the Cliffe Feoffees (*see Introduction*) from the early 18th century. Tt was one house until 1720, when it became two dwellings. In 1735-6 they were leased to a carpenter for 99 years. A 1762 advertisement describes the auction of the unexpired term of 70 years for a house and carpenter's shop. The lease was reassigned in 1765 to '*Thomas Woolgar (gent) or son'*– the lease had 30 years to run. Thomas Woolgar was a prominent Lewes man and spent a lot of his time compiling facts about the Lewes area. His writings are in the library of the Sussex Archaeological Society. It is believed that it was Thomas Woolgar who put two shoes of different sizes, along with a cricket ball, in the wall of the sitting room. Shoes were often put near a chimney breast to bring good luck.

The cricket ball is said to be the oldest such ball in the world. In 1775, Cliffe had formed its own cricket club and played up on Cliffe Hill.

The shoes and the ball are now in Anne of Cleves House Museum.

No. 17 was the last house to be sold by the Cliffe Feoffees in an auction in 1985.
