The restaurant was formerly a **workmen's cafe** when we first opened in 1984. We decided to convert to an "up-market" restaurant in 1988, and this was when **La Scarpina** was born, however after a 7 year era we decided to convert again to a Pizzeria Restaurant which we called "**Giorgio's**".

However we did not want to be like any other typical Pizzeria Restaurant, so we tried to offer the original and traditional pizza and pasta dishes. This enabled us to educate people's taste to the original recipes of a **True Italian Pizzeria Ristorante of Italy**, and keep some of the dishes from La Scarpina but also introduce a vast selection of true Italian Pizza's and more of a selection of traditional Pasta dishes as well. These included the traditional Pasta dishes of Spaghetti, Tagliatelle and Penne, with a variety of sauces. Also a selection of Chicken, Veal, Steak and Fish Dishes.

We have now been going for a further 5 years as a Pizzeria Restaurant and have successfully educated a wide span of clientele who are able to share the local hospitality of a family-run authentic Italian restaurant, which is renowned for both good quality food and value for money.
